1 JULY

GIFT BEN AKKERMAN PAINTING

Thanks to a gift from **Anneke and Ot van der Sluis**, the Rijksmuseum added a remarkable painting by Ben Akkerman (1920–2010) to the collection. The radiant yellow, precise patterning and striking diamond shape give the work a vibrant presence. Akkerman drew inspiration from the Twente landscape around his home city of Enschede. From the 1970s onward, his paintings became increasingly abstract – almost objects in themselves. He created thick panels, carrying the paint over the edges and introducing relief by working patterns into the surface. In doing so, he secured a distinctive position within Dutch painting while also aligning with international 'Fundamental Painting.' The work will be on view to the public in the galleries from spring 2026.

2 JULY

€1.5 MILLION AWARDED FOR 'GELOOF, HOOP EN LIEFDE'

With the exhibition series *Geloof, Hoop en Liefde* (*Faith, Hope and Love*), six regional museums will bring works of art from the Rijksmuseum to every corner of the Netherlands. Guest curators from outside the museum sector will select works from the Rijksmuseum's collection, offering fresh meanings and contexts to the national collection. In this way, an even broader audience can enjoy the Rijksmuseum's holdings. The **VriendenLoterij** has awarded €1.5 million to the new series. For this programme, we are joining forces with Het Markiezenhof in Bergen op Zoom, Museum Gouda, Gemeentemuseum Hannemahuis in Harlingen, the Westfries Museum in Hoorn, the Stedelijk Museum Zutphen, and the Limburgs Museum in Venlo.







FIONA TAN MONOMANIA

For the first time in its history, the Rijksmuseum gave a contemporary artist carte blanche to delve into the museum's extensive collections. The result was the exhibition Fiona Tan: Monomania. Tan's fascination with 19th-century representations of psychiatry yielded a compelling presentation that charted a journey through states of mind. The exhibition was made possible in part by the Mondriaan Fonds and the Vrouwen van het Rijksmuseum Fonds. On view were, among other works, prints from Francisco Goya to Edvard Munch, paintings by Raden Saleh, Japanese masks, and christening gowns from the Rijksmuseum's collection.

MINI DOCUMENTARY SIGNAAL 1 AND SIGNAAL 2

In 1964, the artist Carel Visser created two large abstract sculptures: Signaal 1 and Signaal 2. For years they stood like modern temple guardians at the entrance of the office building of the PTT Postchegue- en Girodienst (the forerunner of KPN and PostNL) in The Hague – until one day they vanished without a trace. How did these iconic works end up in the Rijksmuseum Gardens? Our partner KPN produced a mini documentary that vividly captures the journey of Signaal 1 and Signaal 2 over the years.

PRIDE EVENT AFTER HOURS

Over 300 young adults attended the special *After Hours* event at the Rijksmuseum. With support from the **VSBfonds**, a programme of workshops, lectures, and activities around gender and sexual diversity was organized. Over the next three years, the Rijksmuseum will devote special attention to this theme through events linked to Amsterdam Pride.

FELLOWSHIPS 2025-2026

We are proud to welcome our new Fellows for 2025–2026. Through the Rijksmuseum Fellowship Programme we offer emerging talent the opportunity to conduct part of their research at our museum. In doing so, we aim to support high-quality academic research, strengthen ties between the Rijksmuseum and universities, and foster the exchange of knowledge. This month, Maria Puzyreva (USA), Weixuan Li (China), Victoria Ward (UK), and Leendert van der Miessen (NL) began their research. We look forward to sharing their results in a year's time. MIZUNO'S TRIBUTE

For runners and trainer enthusiasts, our partner **Mizuno** has launched new limited-edition shoes inspired by the Rijksmuseum collection. Once again this year, Mizuno and the Rijksmuseum collaborated as part of the TCS Amsterdam Marathon 2025. The result is a limited-edition running shoe and a trainer, both inspired by early 20th-century Japanese kimonos. Previously, Mizuno released limited-edition shoes inspired by Rembrandt, cranes and Vermeer.

GREENERY AT THE RUKSMUSEUM

There is strong demand for gardeners with knowledge and a passion for planting. In a time when creating and caring for green spaces is essential for the climate and our living environment, promoting this craft and expertise is urgently needed. In collaboration with Yuverta and the Municipality of Amsterdam, the Rijksmuseum offers the training programme Greenery at the Rijksmuseum. In September a new cohort of MBO students started, and for one day a week over the coming year they will work in the Rijksmuseum Gardens under the guidance of their teacher and the gardens' planting designer. The students also make regular excursions to exemplary projects and nurseries, where they receive guest lectures from experts in the field. At the end of the placement they receive a certificate that supplements their diploma. We are able to make this training programme possible thanks to the support of the Don Quixote Foundation/Rijksmuseum Fonds.

OCCUPIED CITY STEVE MCQUEEN

The Rijksmuseum is presenting two versions of the 34-hour video artwork *Occupied City* by the artist and director Steve McQueen. *Occupied City* is a portrait of Amsterdam through McQueen's eyes and is based on the book *Atlas of an Occupied City. Amsterdam 1940–1945* by Bianca Stigter. For 137 days the façade on Museum Square served as a giant projection screen, with the film shown day and night without sound. Over a period of 40 days, the film will be screened several times inside the Auditorium, with sound. The presentation of *Occupied City* at the Rijksmuseum was made possible by the **VriendenLoterij**.

THE NIGHT WATCH'S LITTLE DOG UNDER THE MICROSCOPE

During Operation Night Watch a surprising discovery was made: the barking dog in Rembrandt's masterpiece turns out to be based on a drawing by Adriaen van de Venne from 1619. This demonstrates how Rembrandt took inspiration from existing drawings and then made them his own. As Taco Dibbits told the press: 'It is remarkable that even after 400 years new discoveries are still being made about one of the most studied paintings in the world.' The discovery plays a central role in the first episode of the six-part series The Night Watch: Every Inch a Story. The YouTube series takes viewers behind the scenes of Rembrandt's most famous painting in six short episodes full of exciting discoveries and hidden details, with the ground-breaking restoration project Operation Night Watch as the through-line.

ISAMU NOGUCHI IN THE RUKSMUSEUM GARDENS

Isamu Noguchi in the Rijksmuseum Gardens is the twelfth instalment in the series of free garden exhibitions. Today, Noguchi is best known for his design classics such as the Akari lamps, but he was also one of the most prominent sculptors of the 20th century. The garden exhibition is open to all and has been made possible by the **Don Quixote Foundation/Rijksmuseum Fund, Pon**, and the **Rijksmuseum Club**.

REPRESENTATION IN THE COLLECTION
